

From The Revd Andy Froud

Dear Friends

IN THE 2005 version of King Kong, as the ship approaches Skull Island, a message is received in Morse code, supposedly announcing a warrant for Jack Black's arrest. However, this isn't actually what the code translates to - what it actually says is, "Show me the monkey!"

This is just one of thousands of what is know as "Easter eggs" in films and video games: an "in" joke, added deliberately by the makers for those who perhaps pay too much attention to what is going on in the background.

We are perhaps so used to see the supermarket shelves filling up in January with chocolate eggs that we forget the older tradition that easter eggs were painted or dyed chicken eggs. And behind that tradition is both the symbolism of the stone rolled away from the empty tomb and the new life which springs from the egg. The outside of the egg looks dead but inside there is new life, which is going to break out. Above all the Easter egg is a reminder that Jesus will rise from His tomb and bring new life.

What the newest film easter egg should remind us of is, first of all the joy and surprise of the first disciples at discovering that Jesus was alive. The same Jesus they had left families, friends and livelihoods for, followed for three years and then seen die on a cross was raised from the dead. That was a life-changing experience for the disciples.

Secondly, the extraordinary reality of the resurrection is at the heart of the Christian life: this is hope not just for the next life for this one. The resurrection life is one which God calls us to live every day

LMIGHTY God, who through thine only begotten Son Jesus Christ hast overcome death, and opened unto us the gate of everlasting life: We humbly beseech thee, that as by thy special grace thou dost put into our minds good desires, so by thy continual help we may bring the same to good effect; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Spirit, ever one God, world without end.


