### From The Revd Andy Froud

### Dear Friends

A South American bishop used to tell the story of a young lad in the slums.

Like so many of his age he fell into the gang life of petty crime and vandalism. One day they had been messing around and vandalising a local church when the priest found them and confronted them. All the gang escaped bar this one kid: but the priest told him he wasn't going to call the police. He gave him a challenge: if you can walk to the front of the church and say "Jesus, you died for me but I couldn't care less" - you can go free.

The boy laughed; it seemed such an easy way out. But as he walked down the central aisle of the huge, ornate church and saw the figure of Jesus on the cross his bravado left him. He couldn't drag his eyes away from the broken figure of a man, hung on a cross. As he stood at the foot of the crucifix he found he couldn't say the words.

The reason we know the story is because that young lad went on to be the bishop who told the story himself.

Did this really happen? This is how I remember it being told to me as a child and it has always stayed with me.

Is it true? I believe that Jesus died for me: I am still discovering what that simple phrase really means. I believe that if we truly understood a mere fraction of the love of Christ for us revealed on the cross then we too would be changed and through us the whole world would be changed.

May the peace of the Crucified and Risen Christ be yours this Eastertime,



God of compassion, whose Son Jesus Christ, the child of Mary, shared the life of home in Nazareth, and on the cross drew the whole human family to himself: Strengthen us in our daily living that in joy and in sorrow we may know the power of your presence to bind together and to heal; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

### CONGRATULATIONS RALPH

The Hon Ralph C. Assheton TD DL has been appointed High Sheriff of Lancashire. As the new High Sheriff, Ralph will be sworn in at a ceremony on Friday, 5<sup>th</sup> April when he takes over from the incumbent High Sheriff, Anthony Attard OBE DL.

### LANDMARK TREES

The Forest of Bowland has many wonderful old trees which contribute so much to the beauty, heritage and biodiversity of the area.

Unfortunately, many of these old trees are nearing the end of their lives, whether that be through old age, disease or storm damage.

In order to safeguard the unique character of the Bowland landscape, Champion Bowland and the Forest of Bowland AONB Partnership are working with landowners and local businesses to ensure the next generation of trees are established before their forebears are lost.

Downham Estate very kindly agreed to host the pilot phase of this new Landmark Trees initiative with the planting of a field maple beside the old stocks at the top of the village.

The tree is just a stone's throw from the Assheton Arms, whose proprietors — the Seafood Pub Company — are the first official sponsors of the project.

Lord and Lady Clitheroe joined Champion Bowland trustees and staff from the pub to launch the initiative last month.

# THE PARISH CHURCH 'CHURCH ELECTORAL ROLL

UNDER the Church Representation Rules a new Church Electoral Roll is being prepared. All persons who wish to have their names entered on the new Roll, whether their names are entered on the present Roll or not, are requested to apply for enrolment not later than 15th April, 2019.

The new Roll will come into operation on 28th April, 2019 The new Roll shall be published for not less than 14 days In church.

Under the Rules any lay persons are entitled to have their names entered on the roll if they are baptised and aged 16 or over; and have signed a form of application for enrolment:

Forms are enclosed in this newsletter and may be returned by posting in the box in church by 15th April.


VESTRY MEETING ANNUAL PAFROCHIAL CHURCH MEETING
