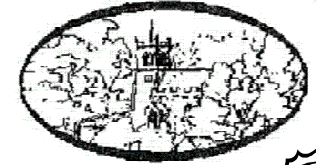

From Canon Rodney Nicholson

Viewpoint



THE TENT dwellers outside St Paul's Cathedral were a delightful bunch when I met them ten days ago. I had been invited to a Children's Society presentation in the Cathedral crypt and so, making my way to the preliminary 5pm Evensong, passed these charming and relaxed "protesters" in the grounds outside. They included a large dog which, I guess, was also protesting against the capitalist system.

These people, in my opinion, enhanced the Cathedral rather than "spoil the view" because they were emphasising a point that needs to be made, not least by the Church itself. Far from saying "yes" all the time, Christians are supposed to turn the world upside down and be agents for the kingdom of God. It would be easy to throw cheap jibes at the demonstrators, saying that they go home at night to enjoy comforts paid for by capitalist money, or that they are unlikely to change the policies of the banks. The deeper truth is that these people are protesting against greed and selfishness in the financial institutions – a view which is shared by many city workers themselves. According to a report commissioned by the St Paul's Institute, 75% of City professionals agreed that "there is too great a gap between rich and poor".

Money is not the root of all evil; it does tremendous good. Bill Gates with his generous support of anti-malaria vaccines shows how money can benefit huge numbers of people. By contrast, many of the City's activities are designed chiefly to benefit the financial interests of a rich minority who, as our Bishop has pointed out, enjoy "loadsamoney" lifestyles while others face austerity.

When Christ judges the world, one criterion in his judgement will concern people's response to the hungry, the homeless, the sick, the prisoner and the dispossessed. The St Paul's report revealed that 76% of the financial-sector workers interviewed did not believe that "The City of London needs to listen more to the guidance of the Church". Those who dismiss the Christian message would do well to remember Jesus's parable about the successful businessman who suddenly dropped down dead and then had to face the God for whom he had previously had no time. The bankers, as all people, will need to give an account of their lives. To listen to Christ now and use money to relieve human need would be a wise way of preparing for that day.

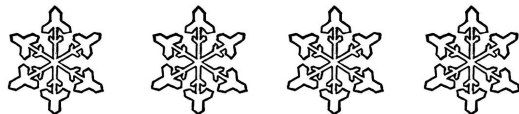

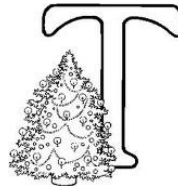


Chatburn Carol Concert

Lancashire Sings Christmas

AMONG the many carol singing events this month is the BBC Radio Lancashire "Lancashire Sings Christmas" on Thursday December 22nd at 7pm, when groups are invited to meet in a non-church venue, such as a pub, supermarket or community centre, then tune into the local radio and sing along with the Salvation Army band some well-known carols. Carol singers can phone or text in, making the event an interactive experience. All are welcome at Downham's local venue - the Brown Cow at Chatburn - so come and enjoy the experience! 36 venues have been registered so far across Lancashire but this number is increasing.



ROAD WORKS

It came as a surprise to everyone to find that Chatburn Road was to be closed for repairs. Sadly Lancashire County Council as the Highway Authority did not cover themselves in glory! Those of you who tried to call the 0800 contact number on the roadside notice found that it did not exist. Neither the Parish Meeting, District Councillor nor Estate, had any better information until the Thursday evening when the Road Closure notice was published. In the event the workmen on the ground were mainly helpful in letting locals through and the little bit of resurfacing that was done is an improvement. Enquiries continue via Gary Scott our District Councillor as to what went wrong and why, in the hope that LCC can do better next time.

ROADSIDE TREES

Recently a number of small roadside saplings have been felled. These self sown trees were undermining the adjoining drystone walls and threatened to knock them down in future years if left untouched. Thankfully there are plenty of young trees in hedgerows and woods, so the effect on the wider environment will be minimal.



SMITHFIELD FARM

Work started early in November to put a roof over the disused silage clamp at Smithfield. The work had received planning consent in the summer, together with a promise of grant from the Rural Development Programme for England (RDPE), which DEFRA administers. The new roof will match the existing shippon, but give Bowland Bioenergy the opportunity to manufacture and store woodchips for fuel, whatever the weather.

THE NEW "DUTCH ELM DISEASE" – PHYTOPHTHORA RAMORUM

A deadly tree disease has been discovered lurking in Churn Clough wood at Sabden. Phytophthora Ramorum (Pr) is a fungal disease from the USA, which initially infected Rhododendron. Sadly it has now gained the ability to infect other plants and trees, both broadleaves, conifers and shrubs (such as bilberry). Infected trees, especially Larch, soon produce millions of spores which drift in the wind, before dying. The Forestry Commission is currently trying to control the outbreak by felling every tree within 100m of any infected one.

At Churn Clough this means that the whole wood will have to be felled by 30 March 2012. Aerial photographs indicated that Hookcliffe wood might have been infected. Thankfully this was not the case, but it remains at high risk. Plans for more felling around the Estate, especially of Larch, are under discussion in the hope that pre-emptive work might be able to avert the need to fell whole woods.
