

From Canon Rodney Nicholson

Viewpoint

I N MY last parish I had a very gifted and generous youth leader, whom I'll call Sue. She was a firmly committed Christian. She had definite views, which is no bad thing. She was also "always right". Sue just seemed to know what was happening before anyone else did, and her confident manner made you reluctant to argue with her, unless you really knew better she did which normally you didn't.

One Christmas, however, we had a good-humoured argument at the youth fellowship because I insisted we had done one thing the previous year, whereas she was equally insistent that we had done something else. The issue itself was trivial but on this occasion I knew I was right and was not prepared to give way. After all, truth is truth. The young people began by siding with Sue, then one by one they agreed with me, and Sue herself gave way.

The episode made Kathleen and me wonder whether at other times we had accepted Sue's word whereas, in fact, she may have been wrong. It's easy to follow a strong leader. Unless you are really sure of your ground, it's safer to believe someone who "knows" than to disagree and maybe spoil a relationship. Vicars need to strike that balance between, on the one hand, giving a good lead and, on the other, browbeating people who know less than they do on a particular matter. That is one reason why we omit verse 3 from "Once in royal David's city" because it suggests that children should be "mild". Mildness is not a virtue. We should ask questions and stick to our guns, whilst accepting that we may just possibly, on rare occasions, be mistaken.

We have just celebrated Christ the King Sunday. Though King of all, Jesus never dominated people but took the form of a servant. Though the world was made through him, he was willing to be manhandled and be fastened to the cross in shame and agony. He let one woman argue with him, another touch him and from another he asked for a drink. He called his disciples friends, not servants. He was the King of glory but also the donkey-riding King of humility. May Christ, and no one else, be our king, and may we share his kingly attitude.

GENEROUS PEOPLE

WHEN Typhoon Haiyan devastated parts of the Philippines a fortnight ago, public generosity soon outstripped what the generosity soon outstripped what the government promised. The government increased its aid to £20m but the Disasters Emergency Committee (DEC - which includes organisations like Christian Aid, Tear Fund, Oxfam and Cafod) has so far raised £50m. It seemed reasonable to expect that Children in Need, falling in the same week, would not get as much as last year, but in fact the appeal set a new record of £31 million.

When it is alleged that this is a selfish and heartless age, these facts are worth remembering. Yes, some people are selfish - perhaps through being brought up that way - but many others are happy to give. For the year 2011-2012, individuals in this country gave a total of £9,300,000,000 (£9.3bn) to charity although, taking account of inflation, it was the lowest annual figure since the survey began in 2004/5. But it is still a significant amount of money.

My own policy is to think the best of people and it usually works. Of course we are all sinners with a good deal of self-centeredness but John's Gospel says that Jesus, the true light, gives light to everyone. Jesus himself looked for goodness in people, rather than trying to put people down.

A great Christian Remembered

E DIED 50 years ago in Oxford - the author of the timeless Narnia novels. Clive Staples Lewis (64), known to his friends as Jack, or to the world as C.S.Lewis, changed the Christian world and still causes fascination. Tragedy twice struck the life of the Oxford professor of English Literature. His devoted mother died when he was 10, causing his father to send him to a cruel boarding school where, as he wrote later, the only gentleness was "the affection" of some sixth formers to their juniors (or fags). Then, later in life. Jov. his wife for only one year, died of cancer. As she was a divorcee, they could not then be married in a Church of England parish church.

A former atheist, CS Lewis became convinced that only through believing in God could a person make sense of the world, but he was not yet a Christian. On a double-decker bus in Oxford he felt sure that Jesus Christ was God's Son, who brought life in all its fullness. He felt that a light had been switched on, and from that moment he used his great powers of thought and creative writing to promote the Christian faith - in all its vitality, colour and

One of his famous sayings was: "Aim for the world and you don't get it; aim for heaven and you do get it - and the world thrown in as well."


The novelty idea of an early dinner at the Assheton Arms on a combined ticket attracted no fewer than thirty playgoers each night and received favourable reviews from many customers.
