### From The Revd Andy Froud

### Dear Friends

In August 1945, the US army dropped a secret over Japan: nuclear bombs, which instantly killed tens of thousands of people in Hiroshima and Nagasaki.

More than 6,000 miles away, in northern New Mexico, one newspaper carried this headline "Now They Can be Told Aloud These Stoories [sic] of the Hill" blared the Santa Fe New Mexican. The article revealed that Los Alamos – a mysterious town, built on a picturesque mesa – had been instrumental in the creation of these new weapons of mass destruction. To guard its secret, Los Alamos had been built to be almost completely self-contained. There were schools, a hospital, and theatres that doubled as dance halls on Saturdays and churches on Sundays. All incoming truckloads were labelled as common items to conceal the true nature of their contents, and any outbound correspondence by those working and living in Los Alamos was censored by military officials. By the end of the war, it had a population of 6,000.

Perhaps the biggest secret in the world had been revealed, causing death and destruction and changing the course of human history.

But was it really the biggest secret? Over 2,000 years ago a baby was born into abject poverty to the parents of refugees. His birth, life and death went largely unnoticed by the world's greatest empire. But steadily and with increasing speed the news was taken to the whole world that God had been preparing history for a decisive turn.

Jesus' secret birth in Bethlehem was to change human history and to bring life and hope to all humanity: "Now They Can Be Told Aloud These Stoories!"

BLESSED Lord, who hast caused all holy Scriptures to be written for our learning: Grant that we may in such wise hear them, read, mark, learn, and inwardly digest them, that by patience and comfort of thy holy Word, we may embrace and ever hold fast the blessed hope of everlasting life, which thou hast given us in our Saviour Jesus Christ.





### **TOP ROW ACCESS**

THE shared access to Top Row and the Assheton Arms has been re-surfaced. Unfortunately the job took longer than planned as the surface water drain was in a worse condition than anticipated, so lots of digging was required! Hopefully the end result is worth the wait for all concerned.

#### STREET LIGHTS

AT THE Parish Meeting, concern was expressed about the unexpected changes made to Heritage street lights around the village, replacing them with stainless steel LED down lighters and then re-replacing some with a different Heritage lamp. Enquiries made on our behalf by RVBC have found that an over enthusiastic contractor who was meant to be repairing/replacing lights in Chatburn had gone further than he should. LCC is meant to consult the Parish and District Councils, but are too short staffed to do so. LCC hopes to consult (staff permitting) with a view to eventually changing all the lights to the new Heritage pattern (these have square panels rather than round ones). An example is by the bridge. The bulbs will eventually be changed to LEDs. The end result should be lamp posts that do not stick out like sore thumbs during the day, but give reasonable lighting at night.

### **OPERATION CHRISTMAS CHILD**

MANY THANKS to all who assisted in reaching the grand total, from our combined churches of 66 shoe-box presents for children who would otherwise receive none at Christmas, AF

November thousands of churches, groups and individual donors prepare and collect shoeboxes filled with toys, school supplies, personal items,

and other small gifts.

Three years later the shoebox gift project merged in a partnership with Samaritan's Purse, sharing 20 years of expertise in relief and aid work and expanding the reach of the shoebox gifts to more than 28,000 children during that year. Since 1993, Operation Christmas Child has delivered gift-filled shoeboxes to over 146 million

children in more than 100 countries.
