Let's simply enjoy the festival without any need to complain. After all, one aspect of the true meaning is that we are good news people, passing on, at least in spirit, the Good News, or glad tidings, which the angel brought to the shepherds in the fields above Bethlehem. But there's not much good news in the complaints department.

We have a wonderful God. If we really believe that, out of his love for us, he became a human being, born in a manger, then we do not lose our excitement at this lovely season as the years pass by. The question is, "Do we really believe?"


A small group of us listened to The Messiah in Blackburn Cathedral recently. Sung by the Blackburn Music Society it was a superb performance. During the interval, however, I got talking to a choir man who enthused about The Messiah, but admitted that he liked the great oratorio purely for the music and singing. He had no faith in the Lord by whom it was inspired. That seemed to take the heart out of the great piece.

The same applies to Christmas. It will be just a matter of food and alcohol, festivity, money and, to a degree, pointlessness unless we have a living faith in Christ the Lord of all. Of course, you can have a good and generous time without any faith, but the depth and continuing joy comes from kneeling before the Babe of Bethlehem and making him the focus of our lives. "O come to us, abide with us, our Lord Emmanuel".

We can be glad that the true meaning is apparent in Clitheroe in many ways: the crib by the castle, Andy Froud's St Nicholas night Walking Nativity on December 6th and all the carol/Christingle services. There's also abundant good will - seen, for example, in local support for the Salvation Army toy appeal. Our Lord was born in poverty. We in turn respond to those who have real needs - maybe lacking the means to heat their home. Here at St Leonard's we especially support the Food Bank and The Children's Society. All this ensures that blessed Christmas which I hope you will enjoy.

SIXTEEN of us from Downham, Chatburn and St Paul's went to St James last month to see and hear the new Bishop of Blackburn, Bishop Julian. Over tea before the meeting, attended by Deanery Synod members, we had the pleasure of meeting his wife Heather too.

The Bishop said that he had visited both the previous Bishops of Blackburn, Alan Chesters and Nicholas Reade, to hear their views of the diocese. He told how he had been appointed to a daunting job but believed he had been given good advice in being told: "Just be yourself".

Bishop Julian had come to Christ as a teenager through the teacher, now a Reader, whom he had asked to preach at his consecration service in York Minster. In choosing him, Bishop Julian was deliberately honouring the place of Readers and lay ministry in today's Church.

NELSON MANDELA STILL SPEAKS

MANY of us have been aware of Nelson Mandela all our lives. I remember my father's outrage when he was given life imprisonment on Robben Island in 1964. It was the white South African authorities' big mistake. You cannot stifle the voice of freedom, and from his prison cell Mandela evoked passion, loyalty and the hope that one day the evil apartheid system would be overthrown.

We now know more of the degrading cruelty of the apartheid system which led black people to be forcibly removed from their homes, made to live in squalid townships and humiliated in all sorts of ways. As a child Archbishop Desmond Tutu heard a white shop girl call his father, who was a primary school headteacher, "boy". At Sharpeville in 1980 white South African police shot dead 69 black demonstrators - mainly in the back - and injured over 180 - one among other atrocities.



Nelson Mandela grew in stature during his 27 years in prison and emerged as a reconciler, determined to forgive those who had ill-treated him. He became the first president of the new multi-racial South Africa in 1994 and soon afterwards received the Nobel Peace Prize which he generously shared with his former opponent, F.W. de Clerk. As the world pays tribute to this great leader, we thank God for his endurance.

Put in a good word for MPs

I NEVER share the low opinion of MPs which many seem to have. It is not the view of Leslie Griffiths, a Methodist minister and life peer, who sits in the House of Lords with the Labour Party. He said that whilst, as in all professions, there are some corrupt people, most he found - of all parties - were doing a conscientious job.

As a body MPs are viewed with distaste but when we actually meet one, he or she is usually a very approachable person with a desire to do their best. As Christians we pray for God's kingdom to come, for which, in Britain, the elected government has a special part.

We should pray for our MPs rather than carp at them. We could even send an encouraging note. Those who are judged as no good need not be re-elected. Over pay, an independent body, not the MPs themselves, recommends the 11% increase. We can so easily slide into envy, blame and criticism. Justice may demand a place for these but we need to be valued and encouraged. We are much more in tune with Christ the Prince of Peace if we try to build up rather than sneer and put down.

Archbishop tackles energy companies

THE ARCHBISHOP of Canterbury, the Most Rev Justin Welby, invited the bosses of the Big Six energy companies to a private meeting in mid-December. He said that energy companies must "behave with generosity and not merely to maximise opportunity" and that they had a huge responsibility to serve society. The meeting comes after the Most Rev Justin Welby said he understood why people felt above-inflation price rises were inexplicable and called on the companies to act with generosity. Four of the Big Six suppliers are believed to be sending their most senior UK executives, in contrast to a recent Commons select committee hearing where just one, E.on chief executive Tony Cocker, attended to face MPs.
