



HISTORY GROUP

N Monday 30th November Roger Frost treated us to a very thorough and entertaining talk about the Calder Valley. With the use of extensive photographs. Roger described the route the Calder takes from its source in Todmorden to its confluence with the Hodder and the Ribble near Whalley, outlining historical features and giving interesting facts en route. How many of us knew, for instance that Dr.T.D. Whittaker, famed for his 1801 book on the history of Whalley, was at the same time an ecologist, who planted 480,000 trees on his estate, larches mainly, for the construction of

ships' masts? Or that there are more deer in Burnley now than there were in the days of Henry IV when it was a hunting ground? Or that the origin of Barley is bare field. because nothing would grow there? Or that rare plants from India and China, brought over by the Townleys. are being sent back to China because they are extinct

there? If you missed the talk or would like to learn more, Roger's book. River Calder is available on Amazon.

Our next meeting is at 7.30 pm on Monday, 25th January at the Village Hall. we have authors of a new book The Forest of Bowland, by Dr. Andrew V. Stachulski, a senior research fellow at University of Liverpool, and. keen walker who has written for many walking publications together with award-winning photographer Helen Shaw, who lives and works in the Forest of Bowland.

This book with its stunning photographic depiction of the Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty reveals many secret landscape gems.

ROUND AND ABOUT DOWNHAM & TWISTON

THE PARISH CHURCH THE ASSHETON SERMON

THIS annual event in the church calendar at St Leonards takes place this year on Sunday, 31st January at the 11.00 o'clock service of morning prayer. We are very fortunate to have Rt Revd Philip North, Bishop of Burnley to preach the Sermon and to dedicate the memorial plague to Nicholas Assheton, our Patron's brother. Bishop Philip is a lively preacher and we hope as many people will join us for this very special historic occasion.

IN HIS WILL Sir Ralph Assheton of ■ Downham, who died on 30th January, 1680 gave £4 a year towards "gratifying two able ministers, other than the present incumbents, of Whalley and Downham. onely for the better occasioning of a fuller congregation of people being willing, for the most parte, to heare strangers rather than their owne (though perhaps better), each of them to preach a sermon upon two severall days, upon the 5th February upon one of these texts 2 Sam. 23.5 or Habac. 3.17,18 and at Downeham on the day of the month it shall please God to call me from this transitory life, upon one of these texts, Job 19: 25-27 or Coll. 2: 3-4."

The Downham Texts have been preached in almost equal measure down the years. The Job is "I know that my redeemer liveth" and the Colossians: "When Christ who is our life, shall appear, then shall ye also appear with him in glory". We shall see which Bishop Philip has chosen on 31st..

We are joined by guests from the Blackburn branch of the Prayer Book Society.
