From The Revd Andy Froud

Dear Friends

The World Economic Forum believes that COVID 19 gives an opportunity to begin afresh and rebuild the economy sustainably following the pandemic. It was unveiled in May 2020 by Prince Charles and WEF director Klaus Schwab.

They called it the Great Reset and through it hope to improve capitalism by making investments more geared toward mutual progress and focusing more on environmental initiatives.

In response a conspiracy has also rapidly spread, also called the Great Reset, which holds that COVID 19 is deliberately designed and spread by powerful and secretive interests to bring about the New World Order.

Whichever of these you believe (or neither) it seems to me that COVID 19 has shown up how unsustainable how way of living was and the need for us to live differently for the benefit of others and ultimately, God's creation. Without forgiveness we remain stuck in the past: without the resurrection, death is the winner.

May I wish you every blessing for 2021 and may you share in Christ's risen life Yours in Christ.

Brexit Passport Twist(on)



Gardening ideas for January

There are many hardy types that can be brought-on indoors to maintain a ready supply of "cut and come again" fresh greens: Rocket, Mizuna and Lamb's Cress to name a few.

Now is also the time to plant garlic (although some sticklers insist that Christmas Day was the cut-off point).

Early seed propagating suggestions: Sweet Pea, Basil, Spinach and Iceland Poppies. Strict hygiene measures for pots and tools and not too much heat as this risks "legginess" and "damping off" (fungal disease).

LESLIE BUCKLE 1927—2020

LESLIE was born in Cumbria, the family moved to Hecklin Farm, Downham when he was very young., He was the middle of three brothers a pupil at Downham School and Ribblesdale School Clitheroe. Working on the farm with cattle and sheep he assumed the tenancy of Hecklin and remained there for a whole working lifetime. Sheep and his dogs were his first farming love.

Leslie retired to Clitheroe but kept some land and a small herd of the rare breed Lonk and was an active member of the Lonk Breeders Association, He continued ballroom dancing notably at Tosside village hall and took up carving sheep-horn stick handles.

Well known as the owner of a distinctly coloured Landrover.it was a familiar site on Twiston Lane long after he removal to Clitheroe.. His nephew David was moved to write a eulogy in verse which was given by Revd Froud at Leslie's funeral. The overflow of people unable to attend the funeral due to restricted numbers paid their respects from the street.

ASSHETON SERMON Sunday 31stJanuary, 2021 at 11.15 am.

THE Assheton Sermon in memory of Sir Ralph Assheton is to be preached by the Revd Mark Williams who is Rector of the Bowland Benefice.

IN HIS WILL Sir Ralph Assheton of Downham. who died on 30th January, 1680 gave £4 a year towards "gratifying two able ministers, other than the present incumbents, of Whalley and Downham, onely for the better occasioning of a fuller congregation of people being willing, for the most parte, to heare strangers rather than their owne (though perhaps better). Each of them to preach a sermon upon two severall days, upon the 5th February at Whalley and at Downeham on the day of the month it shall please God to call me from this transitory life, upon one of these texts. Job 19: 25-27 or Coll. 2: 3-4." The Downham Texts have been preached in almost equal measure down the years. The Job is "I know that my redeemer liveth" and the Colossians: "When Christ who is our life, shall appear, then shall ye also appear with him in glory"

THE REVD. Mark Williams is the rector of the Bowland Benefice comprising the Parishes of Grindleton, Bolton-by-Bowland and Gisburn. He is resident at the Grindleton Rectory. Mark came to the Bowland Benefice from the post of Team Rector of Worsley, Salford in the Manchester Diocese in November 2019.

He started his working life in Grasmere before teaching RE for 7 years at Pleckgate School, Blackburn. After theological college he was curate and then priest in Barnet, North London, and then came to Burnley as Vicar of St. Mathews with Holy Trinity for eight years, before moving to Worsley.

PLEASE NOTE As far as we can tell numbers will remain restricted on 31st so PLEASE make sure that you, including our regulars, book in with the Hon Secretary or Church Warden.

Sometime ago the Diocese advised that we need to plan for the possibility of people from other parishes wishing to attend our service as their Church is over subscribed. Please, please, please make a positive booking if you want to come to the service.

CHURCH SEATING

IN LIGHT of recent research, it would appear that we can have more than 30 in the congregation (except for the national limit of 30 for funerals). The limit would seem to be how many "family bubbles" can be fitted in, while maintaining 2m spacing between bubbles. We have therefore re-jigged the seats to add a few in the south aisle and by the tower door.

The top number that we can accommodate is however dependant on how big each bubble is. In theory we could fit 13 bubbles of 5, plus 5 bubbles of 2 = 75. In practice we will be closer to half that, as most of the congregation are single or doubles.

FINANCES

ST LEONARD'S financial year coincides with the calendar year, so we will soon know how hard Covid has hit our coffers. The omens are not looking good. Most of our expenses have not disappeared (clergy pay, insurance, heat and repairs), but much of our income over 2020 has vanished (only 1 out of 5 planned weddings took place, no summer concert, no visitor donations).

While it has been a joy to see more people in Church on those Sundays when we have been able to have a service. (We currently average 22, when last year we were nearer 15), these extra worshippers do not make up financially for the normal events and donations from tourists that we could have expected to receive.

Please consider making a donation to St Leonard's. It is after all an important part of the community which we would all miss (even those who are not practicing Christians).

DECORATIONS

THE illuminated Christmas cross, which has for the last couple of years brightened up the East window of Church, was moved this year to the south side of Church.

It hopefully brought a little seasonal cheer to those coming down Pendle Road, or even those eccentrics who clamber around on Pendle itself after dark!

PILGRIMAGE

2020 was the year of Cathedrals and Pilgrimages. I had planned to walk the newly demarcated pilgrim route between Whalley Abbey and Blackburn

Cathedral, with the Dean of Blackburn, in the spring. Sadly the event had to be called off because our old friend Covid. Once the second "Lockdown" ended we decided to go ahead with the endeavour. The route is about 8 miles long and uses existing public footpaths, pavements, bridleways and the canal towpath. When starting from the Abbey the hardest part of the walk comes almost at once, in the shape of the south flank of Whalley Nab. Thankfully the path avoids the summit and settles down to a gentle walk through some surprisingly quiet and pretty countryside.

On reaching the outskirts of Great Harwood we were startled to have our mid-day path crossed by a scurrying Mole! Our route followed the pavement through the centre of the town, which in more normal times would have provided a chance to stop for a drink or snack.

As you leave Great Harwood the route takes you through the cemetery, before joining a path that soon leads down to the Leeds Liverpool Canal. The tow path (like the bulk of the route) was virtually deserted. It was hard to believe that we were almost in Blackburn, especially when we spied a Kingfisher darting along!

The last leg of the journey peacefully passed behind Whitebirk, Green Bank and Daisyfield, finally leaving the tow path at the impressive Eanham Wharf. The last couple of hundred yards of pavement prior to arrival at the Cathedral were the only "built up" section where our hiking kit (complete with pilgrim's staves and "Camino de Santiago de Compostella"-esque Scallop shells), felt marginally out of place.

The journey took 3 hours. As long as you time it correctly (or are prepared to wait) you can catch the train to be reunited with your car.

I thoroughly enjoyed the walk and would recommend it, though you do need to take a good map and have stout walking footwear (no need for crampons). There were only two stiles to clamber over.
