From The Revd ANDY FROUD

Dear Friends

As I write this letter the result of the EU referendum is unknown. But I will have a gaze in my crystal ball. Firstly, none of the wildest predictions of either the remain or leave camp will have come to pass. World War Three will not have broken out (or if it has it won't be because of the vote.) Both sides have ramped up their rhetoric to lead people to believe that the the vote will have calamitous effects if their side doesn't win.

Secondly, and partly because of this, there will be plenty of grudges left on both sides. If this campaign has been marked by one thing, in my opinion, it has been a lack of awareness that there will be a June 24th after June 23rd. A lot of what has been said will be remembered and much of the hurt and anger will continue for a long time to come.

James 3:3-12 reminds us of the power for evil and destruction that words can have. Words can be so easy to say but not so easy to take back: even an apology cannot unsay what has been said.

I am constantly aware of the destructive power of the email. Partly this is because in an email it is difficult to judge nuance: was that intended tongue-in-cheek? Or are they really serious? Partly it is because you can't judge the reaction of the other person. But mainly I think that people can write appallingly destructive things in email because they are isolated from its consequences.

Words. of course, can also be sources of encouragement and healing. Human language and its richness and variety distinguishes us from the rest of God's creatures.

But not for nothing is God's creative action before time described as "the word". God says, "let there be light" and there was light. Words can also create, joy, healing and life. May our words be channels of God's light and blessing in this world.

Saving a bit of Lancashire

A **T LAST** the banner project has Heritage Lottery Fund permission to start. Having received, in October last, a generous grant from the Fund for the conservation and presentation of the 1885 processional banner (made to celebrate the centenary of the Downham Benevolent Society) the Lancashire County Council announced the closure of Museums. This included the Museum of Lancashire at Preston, Downham's partner in the venture.

It has taken some time to arrange an alternative home for the banner which includes an agreement that, should the Museum of Lancashire stay open, then we revert to the original plan and donate the banner there.

Arrangements are in hand to transport the banner to Manchester for conservation on 28th July. On 21st July our primary school children are coming to see the banner removed from its lodgings in the organ loft at St Leonards.

Chatburn Cof E Primary School has been a partner in the enterprise since the start, seeking to involve the pupils in the bible story of the banner and history of benevolent societies.

HIGHWAY COMPLAINTS

CC have a web based system for allowing people to report Highway problems, such as pot holes or blocked culverts. This seems very efficient, in that three recent reports were inspected within 36 hours. Sadly the inspecting engineer has to report on what he sees, which is easy for pot holes, but trickier for blocked drains that may have dried out by the time of inspection. Therefore anyone who feels moved to report a blocked drain might be wise to photograph the problem and give it to Ralph Assheton who will try to get it onto the desk of the engineer.

Of course once the inspector has made his report there is no guarantee if and when remedial work will take place! RCA

BUTTERFLIES Ralph Assheton

F ROM April to September I carry out a weekly butterfly survey for the charity Butterfly Conservation. This involves walking the same fixed route (transect) once a week (weather and diary permitting) and recording all the butterflies I see within the imaginary 5m x 5m cube that I am pushing in front of me. This may seem an unlikely pursuit as Downham is not renowned as a haven for Lepidoptera, but in the 15 years since I started I have only once seen no butterflies. It has to be said that I seldom see more than a handful and never more than 35.

I have no expert knowledge of butterflies, but chose them because there are so few species to get to know (57 in Britain of which only 22 are ever likely to be seen around Downham), this is unlike the hundreds of birds or wildflowers that are designed to confuse the beginner.

The prettiest (and to me most exciting) to find is the Common Blue, which is not very common in Lancashire. I have seen several on the footpath at the bottom of Worsaw Hill behind the farm house. "JOYFUL NOISE" is a gathering of folk from various churches, and no particular church, who enjoy joining in the singing of Hymns, we most definitely do not profess to be a choir!

It all started in the summer of 2011 when Roy Porter went home after service one Sunday morning at Chatburn Methodist Church and said to his wife, Daphne, "we've had another Hymn this morning that no one knew" only for Daphne to reply "it was exactly the same at Christ Church" so together they thought that it might be an idea to get together with other like minded folks and try to learn some of these newer Hymns, and some not so new ones. And so Joyful Noise was born. Roy thought that maybe a dozen or so would be interested, but to his amazement we average at least double that.

We meet once a fortnight on Monday nights, regardless of Bank Holidays. Throughout the winter months we alternate between Christ Church and the Methodist Chapel, during the summer when the nights are lighter we go out "On The Road" to Waddington Chapel, St. Leonard's, Downham, Martin Top Chapel, Holden, in fact anywhere that we are invited!

We aim to start at 7.30pm by singing Hymns selected from the 'suggested hymns' sections of the hymn books for the two following Sundays with a few new ones thrown in by Roy, we break at about 8.15 for light refreshments provided by Daphne and her team of helpers, or members at the Churches we visit,. The second half is purely made up of 'requests from the floor', where we all get to choose our favourites to belt out. Usually finishing at about 9.30pm.

We consider ourselves very lucky to have several able accompanists, in Geoff, Anne, David, Roy himself and Andrew on the violin at times, and are usually kept in some semblance of control by either Roy or Anne.

If you enjoy a good sing or like to listen to people enjoying a good sing do come along and join us, we are a friendly bunch, I promise! And remember, singing has proven health benefits too!

We will be coming to St. Leonard's on Monday 1st August feel free to join in or just come to listen, have a brew and a chat. Diana Braithwaite
