

From The Revd ANDY FROUD

Dear Friends

At last month's event at the Preston Guildhall, Mark Ireland, the Archdeacon of Blackburn explained that he has just started taking sailing lessons. Fortunately these take place in a reservoir as on his first lesson he managed to capsize the dinghy. Also, as he keeps going for his lessons someone called Mike will stop for a word or two, ask how he's getting on and show him, for example how to tie a knot. What our churches need, Mark suggested, was more "people like Mike."

His challenge made me wonder why there aren't more people like Mike? These are just a few suggestions - I would be interested to hear your reflections as well.

1 It's not my job: Mike could feel that the sailing instructor was the person who should be teaching Mark. Maybe he didn't have the authorisation to help someone: perhaps that's what some people in churches think. We pay a Vicar- he should do his job, not me.

2 It's embarrassing: we see someone struggling with when to stand up or sit down or where to find the hymns and we don't want to add to (or share their embarrassment). Won't it just draw attention to them? Wouldn't they rather be left alone?

3 I come to sail, not to meet other people. That may be true for sailing but it should not be true for Christians. I often hear people say that they come to meet with God in church. But we meet God in our fellow Christians and everything about the Christian faith is really about helping others

4 I'm not really confident in my sailing ability. I suspect that this is the main reason why people do not feel comfortable in trying to help others in their Christian faith journeys. They do not feel confident that they can help with something that they are themselves struggling with. If you feel that you could do with some "refresher lesson", watch this space - we'll be starting a series in the autumn which will give you an opportunity, however confident or otherwise that you are to grow in faith

COFFEE CLUB


COFFEE club was very busy this month and the new layout of the tables seemed to be a welcome change. The bring and buy stall and books and jigsaws went very well.

HISTORY GROUP

The Silverdale Hoard 23rd May

THE talk by Sue Ashworth, collections manager at the Museum of Lancashire ,entitled 'The Silverdale Hoard: the story so far,' was enlightening on many fronts.

This Viking Hoard, found in a field in 2011 by a metal detectorist, is the third largest silver Viking Hoard found so far in the country, after the Cuerdale Hoard, found in 1840 and the Vale of York Hoard in 2007. Consisting of silver coins, arm and finger rings, chains, ingots and hack silver, used as bullion (for trading), and decorated with punches of fabulous creatures, it was once owned and worn by a Viking warrior. Just why it was left buried in a field remains a mystery.


Sue went on to explain The Treasure Valuation process, carried out by a mixture of dealers and archaeologists, the system of ownership, (half for the finder, half for the farmer) the raising of funds and steps taken to secure the Treasure for Lancashire. She outlined the public engagement programme, centred around the Lancaster exhibition, which involved school children in the production of artwork, and future plans for joint projects with other collections, like the British Museum, as well as a touring exhibition with the York Museum Trust.

Now that the future of many Lancashire museums lies in the balance, we can only hope that this valuable work will not be lost.
