

I AM annoyed when, on the television news, the announcer says that "So -and-so is there *for us*" - in Downing Street, or Paris, or wherever. Most announcers seem to do it - just take notice. I call out, "He's not there *for me* - he's there because it's his job". I think I am irritated because the announcer is trying to make me feel that there's an intimacy between us, which does not exist.

The practice of using Christian names is good, in my view, but with one exception. Someone rings from a company or organisation and says, "Hello, I'm James, or Karen". But I don't need to know their name. It's the company that is contacting me, not an individual. I only need an individual's name if, say, I want to trace the progress with some problem. Similarly, supermarket staff wear their name tags - as if I need to know their identity!

At Christmas we have the irrelevance of Christmas greetings from Sainsbury's or the borough council. Such greetings mean very little. Am I included in the Mayor's seasonal good wishes? Yes, I am, but so what? The vague and general have little value.

By contrast St Paul referred to: "The Son of God who loved me and gave himself for me." I am not just one of millions. I am loved by the eternal Son of God himself, whose love is not wafer-thin, but deep, enduring and was most powerfully seen on the cross.

It is said of some people in deprived housing areas, that they have low self-esteem. A recent Channel 4 series on Blackpool has highlighted the addiction of a significant number of people – women especially – to drinking too much. They literally become legless, after blowing over £100 on one night's absurd consumption. Yet one police officer suggested the reason was that these people had nothing to live for, except to wait for the next drinking bout.

We all need to know that we matter – for ourselves and not for anything we might do or give. Whatever our age or social class, God wants none of us to feel unloved or unwanted. He does not send vague greetings or offer an illusion of concern. His love is sure and solid. Jesus once said that as a hen gathers her chicks, so he would gather his people under his wings.

Is Britain still a Christian country?

THIS question came up at our Lent course. David Cameron apparently thinks that Britain is still a Christian country. Is he right, or not?

Clearly fewer people attend church than years ago, although all my life I have heard it said that congregations have gone down. But, statistically, the number of regular worshippers, taken as a whole, was higher in, say, the 1950s. There is less Bible knowledge today than when I began my ministry. I remember in the 1970s being able to give children a Bible quiz, in which a range of questions could be asked. Today you could ask, "Who was Jesus's mother?" or "Where was Jesus born?", but harder questions would be too much for most children.

After the last War, Archbishop William Temple produced a report, "Towards the Conversion of England", in which he said that, having won the war, England now needed to win the peace by becoming a Christian country (again?). In other words, in 1945 the Church felt that the English needed to be converted to Christ. Although church attendances were higher a generation or two ago, the need for mission has always been there, hence the great Billy Graham campaigns of the '50s and '60s and more recently.

Do bigger congregations equal a more Christian country? Not necessarily. Although churches may have been fuller in the 18th and early 19th centuries, and the Ten Commandments better known, yet society accepted slavery and other social evils. Church-going was high in the Irish Republic in the 1960s and '70s, yet the Church ran those iniquitous laundries for unmarried mothers and other young women. The Church could teach the Ten Commandments yet give protection to a priest who was sexually abusing children.

So, on balance, I agree with David Cameron. Britain *is* still a Christian country. Two-thirds of Britons claim to be Christians. Our history and culture are shaped by the Christian faith. The Church, though smaller, in some ways, is more alive than ever. We are a fairer, less judgmental society. And there's plenty of compassion - love in action.

Feed my sheep, feed my lambs ...

Donations of non-perishable goods for our foodbanks are urgently needed.

The need just in Burnley has gone up from 117 parcels last week to 155 this week. We need regular donations – and not just food, but money too, so that we can ensure we provide the right balance of food. Foodbanks would also welcome volunteers to help pack and deliver parcels. (Further details from Gill or Greg below)

Fewer than 5 per cent of those who use foodbanks are homeless. Most of them are ordinary families with cash flow problems from rising bills, spiralling debt, or delayed benefit payments. Many are suffering from unexpected sickness, bereavement, or unemployment. The demand for help has grown exponentially. As we anticipated, the need will double again as austerity bites, fuel bills rise, and the welfare budget shrinks.

Feed my sheep? (John 21:17) In partnership with churches, Christian charities such as The <u>Trussell Trust</u>, Salvation Army and <u>Community Solutions</u> support Churches to run foodbanks in the Lancashire region.

Feed my lambs? (John 21:15). According to Oxfam, a shocking one in three children lives below the poverty line in the UK. Mothers are choosing between feeding their children or heating homes.

The foodbanks provide emergency food to people in crisis. Most of this is donated by the public. Most recipients are referred by a front-line care worker, like a doctor, a social worker, or a schools liaison officer. As well as emergency food, the foodbanks point clients to other agencies, such as HelpDirect and work with Local Authorities to help resolve the underlying cause of the crisis. They also link with drop-in, homeless and other centres.

So when you are saying grace this weekend, remember the work of the foodbanks. More practically, why not add some extra staples to your regular shop, and drop them off at the collection point in your church.

ASSHETON SERMON 2013

ISTORY Group members were given a very interesting and well-illustrated talk by Dr Graham Cooper, from Grindleton, on the enclosures of the Commons and Wastes.

The history of these events could be traced by the type of walling and hedging used to determine the boundaries of the newly created fields. The advantages and improvements brought about were explained as were the hardships, consequent upon the enclosures, upon the smallest-scale farmers who could not afford the necessary costs of boundary walls demanded by the Acts of Parliament governing enclosures.

The disagreement, of 1570, between common owners of Chatburn and Downham was illustrated by use of a map lodged in the Lancashire Archive.

Dr Cooper's fee, a cake, was very kindly provided by Mrs Philippa McFall.

Members were brought up-to-date with the progress on interviewing evacuees and those around Downham and Clitheroe who could remember the events of 1939.

The group was also informed of the work surrounding the grant application for conservation of the Downham Benevolent Society Banner of 1885.

The next meeting of the group, to be held in April, will be announced when the arrangements for the speaker are completed. TM.
