

Dear Friends

I often get things wrong. Contrary to what my children seem to think , I don't do this just for their amusement and entertainment. Some things aren't that important - it doesn't matter that I thought Taylor Swift was a bloke. Some things are a bit more serious, like remembering to look left and right at roundabouts. This was some-thing I was taught as a result of "needing" to attend a speed awareness course.

I would be the first person to say that I am not always right - but one thing I am sure of - the resurrection of Jesus Christ. St Paul writers to the church in Corinth and specifically to those who are teaching there is no resurrection of the dead that if this is true then all of his preaching and by extension his life, is useless. This is where St Paul takes his stand and where he advises the Christians of Corinth and the Christians of Downham, Chatburn and Clitheroe to take their stand too.

But we don't just celebrate the resurrection at Easter or funerals but every day of our lives. But the church is the focal point of our celebration because that is where in the company of believers we find God's Holy Spirit. The church, to use Eugene Peterson's memorable phrase "is formed by the Holy Spirit to be a colony of heaven in the country of death...an appointed gathering of named people in particular places who practice a life of resurrection in a world in which death gets the biggest headlines."

I might get some things wrong but the resurrection of Christ is something I have a have staked my life on. Again - because he is much better writer than I am - I finish this Easter message with the words of Eugene Peterson, describing the everyday resurrection life to which we are called: "The practice of resurrection is an intentional, deliberate decision to believe and participate in resurrection life, life out of death, life that trumps death, life that is the last word, Jesus life."

DOWNHAM AND TWISTON HISTORY GROUP

February meeting - The coal mines of Read and Simonstone by Brian Jeffery.

 $\sqrt{\sqrt{1}}$ TH maps, diagrams and photographs, Brian Jeffery's informative talk described the geology underlying the Read and Simonstone coal mines. He described how coal was extracted in the eighteenth and nineteenth century from the bowl-shaped seams. running under the River Calder, in mines such as the Dunkirk Colliery, the Calder Colliery and the Pasture mine, otherwise known as Billy Fly Pit. Men toiled underground in shafts up to a thousand feet deep, while women and children pulled the coal-laden tubs and loaded them into carts, to be transported on horse-drawn tramways. Problems such as faults in the rock and landownership were overcome as the area grew in prosperity. Brian's photos revealed the sites of ancient mine shafts, equipment, engine house and waterwheels such as the Constant Mary, while census records, maps and oral testimony filled in the details, uncovering a rich industrial heritage.

The speaker next month, on 21st March will be the Revd Andy Froud. Last year Andy had some weeks of Sabbatical leave and part of his research was about Dr John Webster (1610-1682), cleric, physician and chemist with occult interests, a proponent of astrology and a sceptic about witchcraft. Born at Thornton in Craven, he was head master at Clitheroe Grammar School. The memorial to him in Clitheroe parish church is embellished with a horoscope. Andy has called his talk Magic, Faith and Politics in the Seventeenth Century.

RIBBLE VALLEY MUSIC FESTIVAL

OST things are in place for this years **W** Ribble Vallev Music Festival, and in the course of organising this and putting together some contributions towards articles on the local live music scene for tourist and other publications, it has become increasingly evident that the Ribble Valley is becoming a haven for live music with no less than 6 music festivals this year.

The Ribble Valley Music Festival opens the festival season on 23rd April, followed by the others in the area, and continues after the others and right up to year end.

The Ribble Valley Music Festival has been planned to, once again, bring some artists to the area for the first time, and have a programme that includes the desire by many to have some rare sought after music genres that are not often performed in the area.

The good news in terms of cost to you is that ticket prices remains the same as last year, and very reasonable at between £8 to £10, and you will not be lumbered with a booking fee at any of the events.

A lot of the music can be heard at its best in the marvellous acoustics of local churches, including 16th June at St Leonard's and several at Christ Church Chatburn, as many of you commented last year.

Information leaflets have started to be distributed today and within the first few hours many have been taken.




CANDLE LIGHT SUPPER
