# From The Revd Andy Froud

- Argh! We're going to die! (In response to thunderstorm / huge wave/ rollercoaster/ my driving)
- Yes, we are kids, but hopefully not today.
- Dad, you're weird

My children and I have gone through this routine so many times they can now fill in the responses themselves.

At the heart of the Ash Wednesday liturgy is this phrase - Remember that you are but dust and to dust you shall return. We are called to remember our own mortality, as we do in the funeral service - give us the wisdom to use aright the time left to us here on earth.

The 40 days of Lent are a time for us to remember that as human beings we will all one day die. The Bible tells us that we have three score and ten or four if we have strength: many of course today live longer, but still the truth remains the same - our days are limited.

But the second part of both phrases reminds us of the ultimate purpose, not just of Lent, but of our existence as human being: to turn away from sin and turn to Christ. The 40 days of Lent are in a real sense a time of preparation for the celebration of the great feast of Easter. Our fasting, self-denial and extra prayerfulness prepares us for the resurrection season of Easter. This life is in part just a preparation for life eternal with Jesus

The Common Worship service for the interment of ashes reminds us that though we are dust and ashes, God has prepared for those who love Him a heavenly dwelling place.

# **DOWNHAM & TWISTON** HISTORY GROUP

N Monday 6th February at 7.30 pm at the Village Hall, members remembered Edwin Jackson, a founder member of the Group and owner of a considerable collection of local history material, who sadly died on 30th January. We remembered the presentation which a friend. Dorothy Bradbury, gave in September 2012 to a packed Village Hall about Downham History and his family. Edwin was a generous member who paid the expenses for one of our visits to the People's History Museum in Manchester. We shall miss his humorous asides.

Members of the downhambanner.com group gave a presentation of their progress so far in the efforts to conserve and present the banner to a wider public Sadly the museum arrangements for Lancashire have not yet been resolved. We know that efforts are being made to save the Museum of Lancashire at Preston from permanent closure. This is our preferred resting place for the banner, one where it is likely to be seen by most people.

Some public involvement with the banner is planned for later this year, when we shall take a trip to the conservation studios at the Peoples' History Museum in Manchester, where work on the conservation process will be in progress.

We have also discovered that some other old banners by the same manufacturer (J Skerrett of Bury) are held by a history group at Wardle. in Rochdale, and we are planning to visit them
