Friends and neighbours will have been saddened by news of the death of John announced in the last few days.

We are invited by the family to the Assheton Arms to remember John at 11.30 am on Thursday 5th March following a private cremation at Skipton.

HISTORY GROUP

ON MONDAY 17th February, Andrew Collinson outlined the history of Bellman Park, situated on the borders of Chatburn and Clitheroe. With an insider's view of the area - his family farmed Bellman Farm for 33 years – Andrew demonstrated via documentary evidence from censuses, newspapers, trade directories, maps, photographs and artefacts, the development of the site from early times to the present day. Bellman Farm, the last property in Clitheroe, used to be Bellman Inn or Hark to Bellman before 1825. Its first residents can be traced back to 1287. It is a little-known fact that from 1822-49 there was a racecourse on the site, ³/₄ mile long and attended by up to 5000 people.

Industrialisation began with three lime kilns burning lime for agricultural purposes. Limestone quarrying began with the advent of the railroad in 1850. Rowe and Carter, entrepreneurs from Blackburn started Bellman Lime Works in 1867. Respect was shown to James Carter by the erection of a monument with a drinking fountain. The Bellman Lime Kiln is the only kiln of its kind in the North of England, due to the loading of waggons from underneath. A working party has cleared the immediate site of trees, Andrew hopes that, with the awarding of a Heritage grant, work can now proceed apace to conserve this historic building, so that future generations can appreciate it. We look forward to accompanying him on a guided walk around the site in the summer.



Since then. Zimbabwe has gone through many changes notably the ousting of Robert Mugabe. But the new dawn that so many had hoped and prayed for has not happened. In fact, life for ordinary Zimbabweans is harder than ever.

Mothering Sunday

MOTHERING Sunday is a day celebrated by Christians in the United Kingdom. It is generally observed in parishes of the Roman Catholic Church, Church of England, as well as in the rest of the UK and many Anglican parishes throughout the world.

It falls on the fourth Sunday in Lent, exactly three weeks before Easter Day. Once observed as a day on which people would visit their "mother" church, it has become an occasion for honouring the mothers of children and giving them presents. Although it is increasingly being called Mother's Day, that name properly belongs to the American secular holiday which is guite distinct from the original Mothering Sunday.

At Downham we have long celebrated within a short family service thanksgiving for mothers, symbolised by the giving a small gift of flowers, this year on 22nd March at 11.15 am.

RAINFALL

MONTHLY rainfall figures have been collected at Downham for 151 years. As one would imagine there have been highs and lows. In 2019 we had 57.57 inches, which is above the average for the previous 10 years (51.74 inches) and well up on the 151 vear average of 46.51 inches. However we were a long way short of 2012 which was the wettest recorded at 67.32 inches. RCA
