

From The Revd Andy Froud

Dear Friends

MANY of you will know of my keen interest in the Webster memorial on the south wall of the St Mary Magadelene Church. It is not entirely because it appears in a book called Strange Britain, although as I recently pointed out to our Ladies Group, I am immensely pleased to be Vicar of a church featured in the book.

The man commemorated, Dr John Webster, lived at the time of the English Civil Wars (1610 -82) and the top of the memorial, which we believe he would have designed himself, starts with a Latin riddle: “whoever understands this figure will know that I also understood it”. The design is a star of David with two concentric circles around it and in the points of the star are the symbols of the six planets known at the time. In the centre is the sun.

From this starting place I have, over the last six years, read about the religious and political upheavals of Civil War period, alchemy, the Pendle Witches, Clitheroe Royal Grammar School and the British university system: all interests of this remarkable man. Now I have an opportunity to take a sabbatical of 3 months to bring some of those studies together in a form which I hope will be of interest to anyone who wants to find out more about the rich faith heritage which the Ribble Valley enjoys.

What this means in practice is that Revd Andrew Whitehead will have full pastoral responsibility for St Leonard's during the period from June 29th - 8th October (the period is slightly over three months as it includes some of my holiday). Please refer all of your questions to him during this period, whether personally, by phone or by email. Grateful thanks to him without whom I would not have this opportunity to take a sabbatical

I will still be living in the Vicarage (apart from some study breaks) but Beccy and I will be worshipping at another church (for those of you who like to guess, its not in this Diocese but it is still quite nearby). I will still stop and have a chat with anyone in the street with a minute to spare - just don't mention work!

This will be my first sabbatical in 22 years of ministry so I hope you will excuse my enthusiasm for what might seem a rather arcane area of study and I hope that as with the sabbath it will be a time of peace, refreshment and re-connection with God

There will be an Ascension Day Service of Holy Communion at St Leonard's on Thursday 14th May at 7.00 pm.


**BOILER**

**DOWNHAM & TWISTON HISTORY GROUP**

THE History Group enjoyed a talk by Jean Asher from Settle on 20th April at the Village Hall in which she traced the development of the Quaker movement from 1652 when George Fox first walked up Pendle Hill and then on to Swarthmore Hall where he preached to a large gathering of a thousand people. She highlighted the objections these 'first publishers of truth' had to the established church, preferring to be guided by 'the light within.'

Their refusal to pay tithes and church dues, to swear oaths or to doff their hats and their insistence on holding religious meetings in their own houses meant they incurred severe penalties in the form of heavy fines and imprisonment.

Jean's vivid portrayal of the lives of Newton, Slaidburn, Settle and Downham Quakers reflected the 'Sufferings' of early Quakers up and down the country. She described their meticulous record keeping - a boon for family historians, the care they took of widows, the poor, the sick and the unemployed and the emigration to Pennsylvania of many Bowland Quakers, up until the Act of Toleration in 1689, when finally their religion was tolerated.

Our next meeting is the visit to The Roman Museum at Ribchester on Monday 18th May. Departing the Bridge at Downham at 6.30 pm for car sharing, for the guided tour at 7.00 pm. JP

Suzanne explained that this meant living in a sustainable way. Living and working in this way was based on principles and Suzanne talked briefly about these. They include self sufficiency, minimising waste, recycling, composting, using renewable sources, producing our own food, slowing down and using hand tools to use less fossil fuel. Suzanne also introduced members to the Offshoots Project in Burnley where she works. This project is based in a long-unused walled garden at Towneley Hall and shows how the principles are put into practice. It is open to visitors and runs demonstrations and courses as well as opportunities for volunteering.
