From The Revd Andy Froud

Dear Friends

C S Lewis wrote "I pray because I can't help myself. I pray because I'm helpless. I pray because the need flows out of me all the time, waking and sleeping. It doesn't change God. It changes me."

Change is at the heart of prayer - we pray because we want to see change in this dark world and change in ourselves.

Some people think that prayer comes naturally - but Jesus' disciples felt they needed to ask him to teach them how to pray. His answer is what we call the Lord's Prayer and at this time of year we focus on what "thy kingdom come" means in our daily lives and in communities and churches.

Thy Kingdom Come is a global prayer movement that invites Christians around the world to pray for more people to come to know Jesus. What started in 2016 as an invitation from the Archbishops of Canterbury and York to the Church of England has grown into an international and ecumenical call to prayer. BARBARA AYTON Nee Watson

OLDER residents of the village will remember the Watson family who lived at Chestnut Cottage. The third member of the four daughters born to Tom and Edith Watson has died. Barbara was 90 years old in January of this year. Her two elder sisters having passed away in recent years.

Barbara spent her life in Downham until she married. She studied at the Blackburn College of Art where she displayed a very artistic talent and specialised in Sewing. She ventured to London to work for Mark and Spencer as a designer. She loved her work and was very successful, but it soon became clear that City life was not for her and she returned to Downham and worked as a designer for Trutex in Waterloo Road, Clitheroe. In 1961 she designed and made the Bride's Wedding dress and all the outfits for her sister Anne's wedding

Marriage followed and she and Bill set up home in Newsholme where their two children William and Joanne were born. Much later in life Barbara and Bill made farmhouse meals and customers came from far and wide to relish Barbara's homemade Steak Pie and Chips and Peas. Business flourished for many years, but when retirement came they moved to Hellifield. After Bill died, Barbara remained in the family home and she enjoyed an active life with her many friends in the village. Even then, in later life, she still retained her creative skill.

It was only in her last year that she became unwell and she sought sanctuary in Manorlands and finally in Threshfield Court, near Grassington where she died in March of this year.

She leaves a son William, daughter Joanne and five grandchildren.

With the passing of Barbara, the doors of Chestnut Cottage in Downham have almost closed, leaving within, the echoing memories of happiness, love and comradeship the four daughters of Tom and Edith enjoyed.
