## From The Revd ANDY FROUD

Dear Friends,

As I write this I am being menaced by clowns. Not the England football squad. Real clowns. Actually not even real clowns. I just read an article by a clown complaining how all these stories were doing him out of business. Not a day goes past without my daughters coming home to tell me some new horror story about people dressed as clowns, kidnapping, attacking or murdering people.

The problem is most of these stories are not based on fact. Social media and word of mouth does the work to spread the fear of evil clowns. And fear, as Donald Trump and politicians closer to home have shown, is a powerful weapon.

It is also rooted in our calendar - at Halloween we may fear the American-imported trickor treaters. (Not something I would encourage but arguably less harmful than Yorkshire's Mischief Night). In the darkness of the winter months fear can take root. Clearly, as the Bible tells us, those who want to do evil, need the dark to cover their actions.

But while fear is perfectly natural and sometimes even healthy, ultimately fear cannot rules our lives.

That's one of the reasons that we celebrate the Festival of All Saints in the darkness of the beginning of November. As the prayer says, "in the darkness of this passing age, your saints proclaim the glory of your kingdom". We celebrate all those who have been lights in their several generations.

The antidote to the virus of fear, the Blble tells us, is perfect love. Perfect love casts out fear (1 John 4:18). The word perfect originally means "fulfilling its purpose" or "flawless"; what John means is that it comes from God. Whatever we may fear in this life, we do not need to fear with God.

#### BRAVERY STORY

T Portsmouth on the 14 September 1917, a seaplane collided with a Poulsen mast and remained wedged in it, the pilot (Acting Flight Commander E. A. de Ville) being rendered unconscious and thrown out of his seat and on to one of the wings.

The three men mentioned, at once climbed up the mast for 100 feet, when Rath, making use of the boatswain's chair, which moves on the inside of the mast, was hoisted up by the men at the foot of the mast to the place, over 500 feet from the ground, where the seaplane was fixed. He then climbed out on to the plane, and held the pilot until the arrival of Abbott and Knoulton, who passed the masthead gantline out to him. Having secured the pilot with the gantline Rath, with the assistance of Knoulton and Abbott, lifted him from the plane to the inside of the mast and lowered him to the ground.

The three men were well aware of the damaged and insecure condition of the mast, which was bent to an angle where the seaplane had become wedged. One of the three supports of the mast was fractured, and, so far as the men knew, the mast or the seaplane could have collapsed at any time."

The pilot recovered, married and has 25 descendants. All three ratings were awarded the Albert Medal with Rath receiving one in gold. The Albert Medal was succeeded by the George Cross in 1971 and living recipients were permitted to exchange the AM for a GC

What a tale. We are informed by a descendant of the pilot that Rating Abbott's ashes are scattered in Downham Church yard; he died in1977. He, the descendant of the pilot, is seeking to mark the centenary of the gallantry by meeting up with the present Abbott family. Enquiries, as they say, are continuing.



ORGAN APPEAL

HERE is the second instalment of the story of our trek. Readers will remember from last month that we had climbed Ben Nevis, but been "fogged out" from our attempt on Scafell Pike.

....We spent the night with friends in Anglesey, who kindly drove us to the start of the Pyg Track (one of the many routes up the mountain). Once again all started well, with a good (not too crowded) path and some pretty views. Sadly as we neared the summit the cloud descended and the wind got up. The final hundred metres or so of the Pyg Track entailed a scramble over sharp rocky outcrops on the edge of a precipice. We arrived in howling wind and soon sought shelter in the café. Sadly bouncers were on the door informing all that due to the high winds the café was about to close. Our refuge was thus short lived, but hot chocolate is a wonder drug, so we survived the long and unexciting slog back to Llanberis, completing the walk in 5 hours.

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After another rest day (this time for the Sherpa to recover) we raced back to Scafell Pike. We took the shortest route up the hill from Wasdale Head. Thankfully the ford part way up was easily passable and the leader only fell in one quagmire. Once again the summit was in the clouds, so no need to stop and look at the views. All complete in 4 hours.

The final leg of the trip was to climb Slieve Donard, the highest peak in Northern Ireland. For this we based ourselves in Dublin and snatched good weather to venture north. This entailed an early start to allow for a business meeting in Enniskillen before the climb. Blissfully the weather was almost perfect, so our after lunch start was not a problem. The summit gave beautiful views over the Irish Sea and the Mountains of Mourne. We got back to the car in 4 hours.
