IT TAKES ONE



THIS month will be dominated by events to celebrate the end of the First World War.' The war to end all wars', they said and yet 21 years later we were fighting again and there are still wars going on in different parts of the world. There always have been wars and there always will be until Jesus comes again. We all long for peace and many of us pray for peace; but we feel powerless to stop them.

But what about the smaller fights and arguments we are involved in - within our families, places of work, schools and even our churches. We can so easily write them off as unimportant. But these do matter and do affect us. When I've had an argument with someone, even if I am sure I am in the right, it plays on my mind and is 'there' whatever else I am doing and it affects my work. For some people it is worse and can affect their sleeping and eating and even bring on an illness.

These are 'wars' we can stop. It takes two to start an argument or a fight, but only one to stop it. Dare we be the one to make the first move towards reconciliation? Have we the humility to apologise and the grace to forgive? Can we respect the other person's viewpoint without compromising our own and agree to differ?

There are times when we do all we can to sort thing out, but the other person is not prepared to. What do we do then? I've found this verse from the Bible very helpful: 'If it is possible, so far as it depends on you, live peaceably with all.' (Romans12v18). This verse recognises it is not always possible to live at peace. ('So far as it depends on you') - We have to do what we can, but can do no more. If the other person is not prepared to respond we can do no more and we must not feel guilty about it. But we must do what we can to live in peace.

As we reflect on the horrors of War and give thanks for those who gave their lives for us, may we do all we can to live in peace with one another and pray for peace in the World.


DOWNHAM & TWISTON HISTORY GROUP

RIAN Jeffery's presentation on the Battle of Read Bridge and Whalley in 1643 was very well received on Monday 22nd October. Brian romped through the major historical events leading up to the battle, tying them in with our national history. He began with the Dane Law in 1042, moved on through the conquest in 1066, the arrival of the monks at Whalley Abbey in the thirteenth century and the ensuing agricultural revolution, the English Reformation under Henry VIII, the dissolution of the monasteries and the subsequent land grab, right up to the first of the Civil Wars in 1639-40.

Using innumerable sources and images to help tell the tale, Brian brought history to life. In 1643 the Royalist Lord Derby arrived from Preston with 4000 men. Seizing the weapons stored there, he camped at Whalley Abbey, but was defeated at Read Bridge (not the current one) by the Parliamentarians under Colonel Shuttleworth of Gawthorpe, with just 150 troopers and 500 footmen of Pendle folk. The latter, mainly agricultural labourers, intent on keeping their land, used guerrilla tactics to ambush the Royalists in a narrow lane. They then chased them as far as Ribchester,

brandishing scythes and sickles. Richard Nowell signed the surrender papers for Lord Derby and Roger Nowell retained his estate at Read Hall.

Our next meeting on Monday, **3rd December** at 7.30 pm will be a talk, by Janet Swan on **Ethel Carnie Houldsworth** a working-class writer, feminist, and socialist activist from Great Harwood. As a young woman she was a poet, journalist (writing for the *Woman Worker* in London), children's writer and author. She published at least ten novels during her lifetime and her work is significant not just locally but also nationally, as she is the first working class woman in Britain to be published.


