Dear Friends

As we celebrate our harvests this year we should remember not just the many blessings which God has given us, those who do not share those blessings but above all that "all things come from you and of your own do we give you"

DOWNHAM AND TWISTON HISTORY GROUP

HE SEPTEMBER meeting of the History Group took the form of an outing in lovely weather across Lythe Fell from Slaidburn and on from Bentham to our destination at Tunstall St John where, after a picnic lunch, we were met by Jane Greenhalgh who was a church warden at St John's until recently. She told the story of the Church and in particular of the Picture that had featured on TV and which had recently been cleaned.

A Church at Tunstall is recorded in the Domesday survey but the oldest structure in the present church dates from the 13th century. The church was rebuilt around 1415 by Sir Thomas Tunstal. Alterations were made in the 16th century. In the 1820s it was attended by the Brontë sisters during the time they were receiving education at the Clergy Daughters' School at nearby Cowan Bridge. In 1907 the church was restored by the Lancaster architects Austin and Paley.

Internally there are so many interesting things to see. Architecture. glass, statues and a number of memorials to the Fenwick family. The church also owns. the object of our visit, a 16th-century painting by Francesco Montemezzano probably donated, in the early 19th century, by vicar Frederick Needham, who was a half-brother of the church patron Richard Toulmin North. The painting was removed for restoration in connection with a BBC television programme, in July 2015 when the church was at the centre of an episode in the BBC television series Fake or Fortune? The programme settled the artist's identity but left many questions still to be answered.

Our 17th October meeting will be a presentation by Charles Jepson on The Clarion Cycling Club House at Rough Lee. The Clarion cycling club, began one evening in February 1894 A report of one tour said, "We had spent as grand a holiday as possible. Ah-h! It was glorious! Say no man lives until he has been on tour with the Clarion CC. Members were inspired to set up their own Clarion Cycling Clubs to allow the cyclists to get away for a cheap weekend in the country. The first was a caravan set up over the summer of 1895 at Tabley Brook, near Knutsford, A permanent Clubhouse in an old house was opened in June 1897 at Bucklow Hill, leased from a farmer for 5 years. This was followed an old farmhouse in Handforth which ran from 1903 to 1936. Other Clubhouses were set up in Wharfedale, Halewood, Ribble Valley, the Midlands and Essex.

Only one Clarion House survives and it is near Nelson, opened in 1912 by Nelson ILP. It welcomes visitors, walkers and cyclists still. The subject of our meeting.
