

I HADN'T thought about it until someone mentioned in conversation that we had Great Britain teams in the Olympic games, not separate, national ones for England, Wales, Scotland and Northern Ireland. The result? Great Britain came third, with 29 gold medals and 65 medals in total. Ireland (the republic) came 41st, with 1 gold and 5 medals altogether. This comment is in no way meant as a slur on the good Irish people but it does make the point that we do better when we work together.

Personally, I have no time whatever for Scottish independence or the calls to get out of Europe. We don't want to lose any members of the United Kingdom, not even to loosen the ties.

Whatever may the problems with the European Community, we would hardly want to put the clock back to the days when we fought the Spanish, French, Portuguese, Dutch, Scandinavians, Germans – in fact, pretty well everyone. We need to unite, not go our separate ways, for we belong to one common humanity into which God himself was pleased to be born. Blessed are those who have worked to unite different groups, such as the Corymeela Fellowship in Northern Ireland.

Admittedly, bigger isn't always better, and there were concerns at the merging of the Blackburn and Burnley hospitals. How, for example, would Blackburn mothers cope with the centralising of maternity services at Burnley? In the event, it does seem that everyone is coping very well, though nothing in life is ever perfect. I certainly had quick and efficient treatment when going for an eye test last week. On the other hand, the planned transfer of a regional children's unit from Leeds to Newcastle would seem to be a potential cause of hardship for many families.

When it comes to the church, we would be wise to follow the Olympic lead and operate as Team Christian Church, rather than separately as a multiplicity of separate members, each paddling their own canoe. After all, Jesus prayed for all his followers to be one. We are better off enjoying links with Chatburn and Low Moor than going it alone. We worship together on occasions, some of us enjoy Monday evening hymn singing, and in common with other churches or groups we support Christian Aid and Operation Christmas Child.

Christians, and others, working together are a sign of hope to the world.

"Walk with Witches" Thursday 6th – Sunday 9th September Four guided walks following different stages of the long distance route which is being developed between Pendle and Lancaster as part of the 400th anniversary of the Lancashire witch trials. Meet some of the staff from Lancashire Archives who are responsible for looking after 900 years of Lancashire's archival heritage and take the chance to explore original archives from Chipping and the surrounding area.

Clitheroe Castle Museum Heritage Open Day Friday 7th September, 11am - 5pm, Enjoy free entry to Clitheroe Castle Museum where you can explore the history, heritage and geology of the local area, including Bowland and Pendle Hill, through some fascinating displays.




