From The Revd Andy Froud

Dear Friends

GOT PLANS? Well, a friend of mine had a poster on her wall saving "Failing to Plan is Planning to Fail" and it's hard to argue with that sentiment. On the other hand the letter of James, in a seldom quoted passage, reminds us that planning is nothing to boast about: "Now listen, you who say, "Today or tomorrow we will go to this or that city, spend a year there, carry on business and make money." Why, you do not even know what will happen tomorrow!" (James 4:13). Although it was written in the second half of the first century it is certainly topical for 2020. a year that nobody seems to have planned for. James goes on to tell us: "You are a mist that appears for a little while and then vanishes" We always think that whatever is happening is what will always happen and we put in a lot of effort to make sure that is what happens. But human pride is what leads us to place mistaken faith in our plans when we ought to be placing our faith in God's.

Are we thankful for it ? How do we show it ? In words ? Nothing but words ? Well, words are something, for "by thy words thou shalt be justified, &c." Yes, "We thank the Lord, oh ! thank the Lord, for all His love."



FESTIVAL BOWLAND – September 2020

FROM Black Grouse to Roman roads and hedgerow vinegar – join us for a busy month of online Festival Bowland events:

Tuesday 8th, 6.30pm. Black grouse were abundant in the Bowland Fells between the 1950s and 1970s, but subsequently declined and were absent by the beginning of this century. Dr Philip Warren, senior scientist at the Game & Wildlife Conservation Trust, explains how habitat improvements, and recovering populations further north, may allow this species to be re-established in Bowland.



Wednesday 16th, 6.30pm. Retired civil engineer, David Ratledge, shows how the increased availability of Lidar data has helped to reveal the course of Roman roads in Lancashire, often where features can't be identified on the ground through traditional fieldwork.

Sunday 20th, 10am. Find out about some of the edible and medicinal plants growing in the local area with medical herbalist, Danielle Kay, then learn how to make elderberry syrup and hedgerow vinegar with Danielle's virtual demonstration.



Tuesday 22nd, 8pm. Discover local wild foods with forager, Adrian Rose, and enjoy an online treat as talented chef, Dominique Ashford (of Dalehouse Barn B&B above Slaidburn) cooks up a 3-course seasonal feast.

Wednesday 23rd, 2pm. What is rewilding? Where can it happen? How can you be involved? This presentation by Professor Ian Rotherham introduces the concepts, approaches, and indeed, the potential pitfalls, but above all, the opportunities.

THE Skeleron Mine talk and walk previously arranged to take place on 3rd September is, like so many other events just now, cancelled.


THUNDERSTORM
